Concept Note and Agenda

Background and Justification

Many persons affected by forced displacement today find themselves in situations of protracted displacement. Current policies struggle to find long-term solutions for refugees and internally displaced persons (IDPs) who live in long-lasting situations of vulnerability and dependency.

The EU-funded Horizon 2020 research project “Transnational Figurations of Displacement (TRAFIG)” investigates long lasting displacement situations and aims to inform policy-making by providing new knowledge on how to improve displaced people’s lives and enhance their self-reliance. In order to understand the everyday life, livelihoods, needs and resilience, ongoing research is being conducted among Syrian refugees at multiple sites in Jordan. The research aims to comprehend the aspirations, strategies and different forms of mobility that refugees make use of.

Against this background, the workshop aims to discuss viable policy options and good practices, supporting the identification of possible solutions to protracted displacement. The workshop will further build on the preliminary research results of the TRAFIG project and invites workshop participants to contribute to the analysis of these results. The workshop will bring together humanitarian and development actors working with displaced persons, international organisations, representatives from Jordanian national authorities and academia.

The total foreseen number of participants for this workshop will be approximately **15-20 participants** to allow for a productive and rich information exchange. To better ensure frank discussions and engagement on the policy options and their potential further development, **Chatham House Rules** will be applied.
